## Around GSOP

As the legislative session draws to a close ....

**Minimum Wage:** Between the House and Senate, two bills would increase the minimum wage to \$12/hour in NH. HB 186 and SB 10 vary on sick days, wages for tipped workers, and when increases would go into effect. We expect the two chambers to iron out the differences between these and send the resulting bill to Governor Sununu. Contact his office to ask him stand with NH workers by signing a bill to raise the wage floor in NH. (Office of the Governor, State House, 107 North Main Street, Concord, NH 03301, 271-2121)

**Driver's License:** The House passed HB 397, which would permit NH residents without social security numbers to get drivers' licenses. The bill then went to the Senate Transportation Committee for a hearing at which individuals from the impacted community and clergy shared their stories in support of the bill. The committee voted to re-refer the bill until the next legislative session, giving us time to educate our state senators about the importance of this bill in increasing road safety in NH. [Contact your senator](#) to urge them to support HB 397 when it is brought back in the next cycle.

**Y.O.U.** — Young Organizers United continues to strengthen students’ voices in the decisions that affect them. This recently included getting a non-binding referendum on student representation on the ballot for the November Manchester elections (click [here](#) for news on this exciting work.) In the fall we will host school board candidates forums.

**Immigrant Rights** — GSOP convenes the NH Immigrant Solidarity Network (ISN), bringing together faith communities and others to support our immigrant neighbors. Along with the American Friends Service Committee we participate in prayer vigils 9am on 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesdays at I.C.E. headquarters at 275 Chestnut Street in Manchester.
