We stood in communion with our immigrant siblings, awed by their determination to signal to us that they heard, saw and welcomed our love & witness. A powerful night I will remember for the rest of my life.

## Around GSOP

Our June, 2019 **MICAH Celebration of Community in Action Heroes** was a great success, with almost 200 people honoring those who serve the community in the spirit of MICAH.

The **Immigrant Solidarity Network**, including members of GSOP, and allied groups from New England met at the Strafford County Detention Center on August 24<sup>th</sup> to spotlight "the moral crisis we face as our country targets and expels immigrant families."

More than 500 people walked, marched and biked a combined 280 miles from Concord, NH; Boston, MA; Montpelier, VT and Kittery, ME to Dover, NH, where ICE uses the Strafford County jail as a detention center for people it intends to deport. The 4-day walk included educational events on the inhumane nature of our immigration policies and the need for real reform.

## Final report on the 2019 legislative session ....

**Minimum Wage:** SB10 was passed by the House and Senate but vetoed by Governor Sununu. Though we lack the votes for an override, a similar bill, HB731, was retained in 2019 and will be brought forward again in the next session.

**Driver's License:** Drive Safe NH-GSOP, AFSC, UVIP and other individuals are organizing meetings with Senators to educate them about the bill and hear their concerns.
